Conservation Status: Endangered

- This animal can be found in warm coastal waters of south Florida
- They are herbivores and eat mainly seagrasses and algae
- This animal is a reptile
- They are named for the color of their food

Animal #2 Clues

Conservation Status: Endangered

- They have a very picky diet and primarily eat one type of animal
- This animal is named after their favorite food
- The male and female are similar in size but have varying colors
- Grassy Waters Preserve's mascot

Animal #3: Clues

Conservation Status: Threatened

- This animal primarily eats fish
- They have long legs for wading in the water and bald heads, which make them look similar to vultures
- Their babies make braying sounds, like a donkey; however, the adults do not have a call. Instead, the adults make hissing and popping noises.
- There is a myth about this animal delivering newborn babies to mothers

Animal #4: Clues

Conservation Status: Endangered

- They are skilled at hunting deer, hogs, and raccoons
- They thrive in diverse warm climates such as swamps, wetlands, and upland forests
- Their bodies are mainly covered in beige fur with white and gray spots on the stomach and chest
- Mascot of a famous hockey team







Animal #5: Clues

Conservation Status: Threatened

- This animal can weigh up to 350 pounds
- They can be found offshore as well as in coastal waters of south Florida
- They have a large jaw which allows them to eat conch and crustaceans such as crabs
- They are the mascot for Loggerhead Marinelife Center





Animal #6: Clues

Conservation Status: Threatened

- This animal can grow to be up to 20 feet long
- Can be found in estuaries and other coastal areas of south Florida
- They are carnivores and primarily eat fish, crabs, and small mammals
- This animal is a reptile
