Background Information:

On January 23,2022, the City Commission approved Resolution No. 325-21, which authorized and ratified the City's applications for grants under the Early Learning Coalition of Palm Beach County from the State of Florida Office of Early Learning COVID-19 Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Phase VI grant funding, to support ongoing out-of-school program operations. The Early Learning Coalition provided the City with two (2) [one for each licensed City facility] Early Learning/Child Care Provider Phase VI Grant Eligibility Forms to complete, sign, and return for funding. We have received the grant funds for Child Care Providers Phase VI.

Resolution No. 52-22(F) authorizes the appropriation of the Early Learning/Child Care Provider Phase VI grant funds amending the general fund budget to support on-going out of school program operations. The grant received for each center is as follows:

Gaines Park Community Center: \$38,076
South Olive Park Community Center: \$38,076
Total: \$76,152

Gaines Park Community Center is located in Commission District 1: Commissioner Kelly Shoaf.

South Olive Community Center is located in Commission District 5: Commissioner Christina Lambert.

Fiscal Note:

Background Information:

The City of West Palm Beach Fire Department desires to apply for a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant. This program is designed to hire firefighters. This staffing is critical to maintaining safe fire rescue operations and adherence to National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)

1710 and maintaining the City's favorable Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating of "2".

The period of performance for this grant is three (3) years and grantees do not have to commit to retaining the SAFER-funded firefighters beyond the period of performance.

These new firefighters would strengthen the available force should a natural or man-made disaster occur. Based on a comprehensive staffing analysis, the Fire Department intends to request the funding to hire fifteen (15) firefighters. The requested cost of these firefighters for the three (3) year period is approximately \$4,960,539.90. Under the grant, there are no matching funds required over the three (3) year period of performance. If awarded, the funding will enable this organization to hire, train, and support these personnel. These firefighters will be able to provide all of the necessary emergency and non-emergency service delivery as other employees currently with the department.

Resolution No. 54-22 ratifies the submittal of the grant application to the Department of Homeland Security. If awarded, the grant agreement and a financial resolution will be brought back to the Commission for approval.

If funding is awarded, the City would be required to provide funding for uniforms and bunker gear at \$10,200 per Fire Fighter for a total of \$153,000.

Fiscal Note:

There is no required funding match. The City would be required to provide funding for uniforms and bunker gear at \$10,200 per firefighter for a total of \$153,000.

Background Information:

The City of West of Palm Beach Fire Rescue Department is seeking ratification of its submittal of an application to the Department of Homeland Security for a grant under the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program (AFG). These grants are given to support and enhance the fire safety of the public and responding firefighters.

The West Palm Beach Fire Department intends to utilize the funds from this grant to provide a formal wellness / fitness program for firefighters to reduce injury and illness. These funds will also be utilized to purchase personal protective equipment/bunker gear for the firefighters.

There is a 10% match required for this grant that will come from the Fire Assessment Fee Fund. The total grant requested is \$1,013,950.91 with a match of \$101,395.09. The period of performance is one year.

Resolution No. 55-22 ratifies the submittal of the grant application to the Department of Homeland Security. If awarded, the grant agreement and a financial resolution will be brought back to the Commission for approval.

Background Information:

The City of West Palm Beach owns and manages high-quality native ecosystems that are under the control of or assigned to the City for management, maintenance, and operation, including but not limited to Grassy Waters Preserve/Water Catchment Area, Apoxee area, Clear Lake, Lake Mangonia, Renaissance Settling Basin and its South Lobe. Grassy Waters Preserve/Water Catchment Area and adjacent natural areas are a pristine remnant of the once great Everglades system. Protection of these natural areas are necessary to protect the City's potable water supply. Additionally, these natural area are home to a variety of native wildlife, including, but not limited to the Everglades snail kite, wood stork, white ibis, great blue heron, white-tailed deer, otter, bobcat and alligator.

Due to increased use of the City's natural areas, and a resulting increase in behavior detrimental to the natural areas, the West Palm Beach Police Department and the Public Utilities Department desire more specific regulations for the protection of the natural areas and the City's drinking water system.

Protection of these natural areas provide City residents and visitors with an opportunity to learn about and appreciate these natural resources and wildlife.

The City desires to provide more specific regulations regarding behavior in the City's natural areas, for the protection of its water supply, the natural environment and the health, safety and welfare of its residents, businesses and visitors.

Ordinance No. 4992-22 establishes regulations to protect the City's natural areas.

Background Information:

The City of West Palm Beach Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) and the City's Department of Housing and Community Development are involved in various efforts to provide economic and housing opportunities, to revitalize certain distressed areas of the City.

The City currently owns five (5) vacant properties on Tamarind Avenue that are being considered for future redevelopment by the CRA. The properties are as follows:

Parcel 1 (9th Street West of N. Tamarind Avenue)

East 26 feet of North 55 feet of Lot 2, Block 6, Amended Plat of FRESHWATER ADDITION, according to the Plat on file of the Clerk of the Circuit Court in and for Palm Beach County, Florida. PCN 74-43-43-16-01-006-0023.

Parcel 2 (1006 9th Street)

The West 24 feet of Lot 2, Block 6, FRESHWATER ADDITION as recorded in the Office of the Clerk of Courts in and for Palm Beach County, Florida, Plat Book 6, Page 5.

Parcel 3 (N. Tamarind Avenue Between 9th & 8th Street)

South 45 feet of Lot 1 of Block 6, of the West Palm Beach Development Company, FRESHWATER ADDITION to the City of West Palm Beach, Florida, according to the Plat of said addition on file in the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court in and for Palm Beach County, Florida, less the North 80 feet thereof, which was recorded in Plat Book 6, Page 26. Parcel 5 (9th Street West of N. Tamarind Avenue)

South 70 feet of the East 26 feet, Lot 2 Block 6, amended Plat of FRESHWATER ADDITION to the Town of West Palm Beach, according to the Plat recorded in Plat Book 6, Page 29 of the Public Records of Palm Beach County, Florida.

In furtherance of City and CRA objectives, City staff recommends that these five parcels be transferred to the City of West Palm Beach CRA for the purposes of completing redevelopment projects that will result in the following targeted outcomes:

- Increased Property Value.
- Increased Tax Base and TIFF.
- Reduction of Vacant Land.

- Additional construction and private development.
- Substantial visual impact on the corridor.

In accordance Section 2-31(27)(b) of the City Code of Ordinances requires that prior to the disposition of City property, the City Commission must make a legislative finding that the property is not needed for City purposes, declare the property surplus, and select the method of disposition. The method of disposition may be formal negotiation with an interested party, in this case, the City of West Palm Beach Community Redevelopment Agency.

Pursuant to Section 2-31(27)(c) of the City Code of Ordinances, appraisals are not required for conveyance to another government agency. Due to the public benefits derived, staff desires to transfer the properties at no cost to the CRA.

Resolution No. 288-21 declares that five (5) City-owned properties are not needed for City purposes, declares the properties as surplus, and selects the method of disposition of the properties to be conveyance to the City of West Palm Beach Community Redevelopment Agency.

Ordinance No. 4980-21 authorizes the conveyance of five (5) City-owned properties to the CRA for purposes of furthering the redevelopment efforts in the Tamarind Corridor.

This Ordinance will be scheduled for a Second Reading on March 21, 2022.

Public Hearing of Resolution No. 46-22: A request by Ana Riddell, on behalf of Palm Beach Medical Property, LLC for the abandonment of an approximately 20-foot wide by 214-foot long platted alley, consisting of approximately 0.1 acres, located east of South Dixie Highway between Winters Street and Maddock Street.

Background Information:

The subject property is a strip of land approximately 20 feet wide by 214 feet long (4,280 square feet), and is located east of South Dixie Highway, between Winters Street and Maddock Street, approximately one block south of Forest Hill Boulevard. The alley way is a 20 foot wide alley, which was dedicated to the City by deed, as recorded in Official Records Book 447, Page 628, of the Public Records of Palm Beach County. The alley is a part of an existing parking lot on the property and bisects the easternmost row of parking from the rest of the lot. The alley is also encumbered by an underground utility easement. The owner of the adjacent property on either side of the alley (6910 South Dixie Highway) desires to vacate the alley to build an addition to the existing medical clinic.

The abandonment of the subject property will not result in any negative impact to the surrounding area since the alley is located entirely inside the existing parking lot of the property at 6910 South Dixie Highway. Due to its small size and narrow width, the subject alley has very little (if any) development potential or use to anyone other than the adjacent owner; it could not readily be developed as a stand-alone parcel. Properties of this type are almost exclusively purchased privately by the adjacent landowners for assemblage into their property and it has been determined that will be no negative impact by the abandonment on the City's street system.

An appraisal for the abandonment of the subject property was prepared by Anderson & Carr, Inc., on April 19, 202, and submitted to the City. According to the appraisal report, the market value for the subject area with a utility easement reservation is \$147,000.00. The applicant has agreed to pay the City the appraised value for the abandonment.

STANDARDS: Staff has found the request abandonment complies with the abandonment criteria as established in Sec. 78-217 of the City's Code of Ordinances.

PUBLIC NOTICE: Pursuant to the requirements of Sec. 78-25(b) of the City's Code or Ordinances, individual notices were mailed to property owners within 400 feet of the subject property, and the site was posted. To date, the City has not received any inquiry regarding the general nature of this request.

COMMISSION DISTRICT: The subject area is located within Commission District 5: Commissioner Christina Lambert.
